Evacuation Tips

Instructions issued by officials should be followed immediately to protect your safety.

- Evacuate early.
- Take your emergency supplies that you put together in advance of the fire.
- Locate and prepare your pets and animals.

Animal Evacuation

- Maintain vaccination and medical records for your pets and ensure a copy is in your go kit.
- Have a plan for someone else to care for or evacuate your animals if you are unable to return to your property.
- Be sure to have license and identification tags on your animals.
- Microchip your animals and pets.
- Have carriers, leashes, trailers and other supplies ready to go.

Tips to Keep Yourself, Your Family, and Your Animals Safe Before, During, and After a Fire

Before a Fire

- Make an emergency kit, be sure to remember infants, children, pets, and those with special medical needs.
- Have emergency response and evacuation plans. Practice them.
- Be informed - know how to get information via radio, TV, social media, text alerts, emergency notification systems.
- Learn about and create defensible space around your home and property.
- Get involved in your local Fire Safe Council, Community Emergency Response Team, or volunteer with Animals Services or the Red Cross.

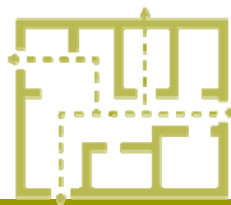


Make a Kit



If you have children or others with special medical needs in your home, you should:

- Have at least a weeks worth of medication in your emergency kit.
- Identify back-up or alternative power sources for electricity dependent equipment.
- Maintain a supply of special food or infant formula.
- Identify alternative transportation resources for evacuation.



Have a Plan

During a Fire

- Stay informed.
- Be ready to evacuate all household members, pets, and other animals.
- Be mindful of the air quality, especially for those with medical conditions such as asthma or COPD. Smoke can make breathing difficult.
- Be prepared for utility outages.
- Locate all of your pets and animals.

After a Fire

- Drive safely through affected areas and watch for power lines and other debris.
- Be careful around damaged buildings and other structures.
- Clean-up safely - wear proper protective equipment, be aware of hazardous materials that may be in the area.
- Identify ways to cope with stress and protect your emotional health.



Be Informed

Medical Needs or Disabilities

If you or someone in your household uses special medical equipment, make sure to have:

- Back-up batteries or power supply
- Prescription medication
- Extra eyeglasses, hearing aids and batteries, walkers, canes, etc.
- Teach others how to use your equipment

Maintaining Your Kit

- Keep your supplies together in one location. Put them into a plastic bin that can be sealed to prevent moisture or pests from getting in.
- Twice a year, make sure that nothing has expired and that you have the proper seasonal supplies and clothing in your kit. A good time to do this is when it's time to change the clocks for daylight savings time.
- Store your supplies in a central location and make sure that your family and other trusted people know where to locate your supplies.

The Basics

Making a kit can seem overwhelming. Yet, most of these items you may already have in your home. Include the basic necessities you and your household may need for a least 72-hours. Keep them in easy to carry containers.

- Non-perishable food and water for 3 days for your family and pets
- First aid kit; prescriptions; and other medical supplies you need—including assistive devices
- Important papers (i.e. insurance policies, birth certificates, medical information, deeds, bank information, etc.)
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Manual can opener
- Battery-operated radio
- Hygiene supplies (toilet paper, feminine products, cleaning and disinfectant supplies that you can use on the go (tissues, hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol and disinfection wipes). Cloth face coverings. Toothbrush, etc.
- Cash
- Extra clothes and shoes for each person



Make a Kit



At Work

You may not be at home when an emergency occurs.

- Flashlight with extra batteries
- Battery-powered radio
- Enough nonperishable food and water for 1 day
- First aid kit and prescription drugs
- Complete change of clothing and shoes
- Personal hygiene items
- Family emergency contact information



Have a Plan

In Your Car

- Flashlight with extra batteries
- First aid kit and blanket
- Bottled water and nonperishable foods, like granola bars
- Extra shoes and clothing
- Leather work gloves

Infants & Children

- Infant formula and baby food
- Diapers and wipes
- Weather-appropriate clothing
- Extra blanket
- Security item (i.e. stuffed animal)
- A few toys or games

Pets & Other Animals

- Pet food, water and bowls
- Leash, collar, harness, ID tags
- Pet carrier
- Vaccine records
- Trailers for larger animals



Be Informed

Evacuation

Instructions issued by officials should be followed immediately to protect your safety.

If you cannot return to your home due to road closures, Animal Services Officers may need to evacuate your animals for you for their safety. To assist officers:

- Register your large animals/livestock in the EDC Animal Services **Farm Animal Database**.
- Ensure your address is readable and fire resistant. Hide a key to your home in an easy to describe location.
- Train large animals to load into a trailer. Maintain your trailer. Practice!
- If your animals are evacuated, they will be taken to a county-run shelter until you can reunite with them.

If your animals are safe where they are, Animals Services Officer will do welfare checks to provide food, water, and clean litter.

Plan For Your Pets and Animals

Disasters can occur quickly and without warning. If you have pets and other animals, it is important to have a plan in place as part of your family emergency plan. Practice your plan.

- Pre-identify pet-friendly places that you can take your pet if you need to evacuate. Keep a contact list in your emergency kit.
- Introduce your pets and animals to friends and neighbors. Show them where supplies are kept in the event you are unable to return home to care for or evacuate your animals.



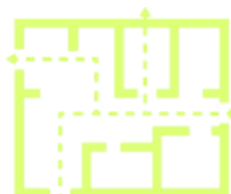

Pet Identification

Maintain current identification for your pets/livestock and other animals.

- Metal identification tags with current information.
- Microchip - Keep your pet's information updated in the microchip registry.
- License your animals. Keep up-to-date.
- Register your large animals/livestock in the EDC Animal Services **Farm Animal Database**.



Have a Plan

Make a Kit

- Have a seven day supply of food, water; remember the bowls.
- Medications, medical and vaccine records, contact information for your family veterinarian.
- A leash, extra collar, harness and identification tags.
- A picture of you and your pet in case you get separated.
- For larger animals, have a trailer and train the animals to load into the trailer.
- A pet first aid kit.
- Keep a pet carrier readily accessible.
